

Segal Is Sworn As Councilman

VENTNOR — Meyer (Mike) Segal was sworn in as a First Ward councilman Monday night to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Dr. James F. Gleason last month.

Segal, who was given the oath of office by City Clerk Frank J. Quigley during Monday night's City Council meeting, was escorted down the aisle to the swearing in ceremonies by First Ward Councilman Rodney Kreischer and Second Ward Councilman Michael Zingarelli.

After Segal was sworn in, he thanked Mayor Warren E. Titus and City Council members for the appointment. He said his family had been residents of Ventnor for nearly 50 years and said he sincerely hoped he could justify the confidence the mayor and council members placed in him. Segal vowed to serve the residents of Ventnor to the "best of my ability."

City Council President Carl Valore thanked Segal for his remarks and recognized for bows several relatives of Segal's seated in the Council chambers.

Segal, 40, is employed as a decorator salesman for the Kensington Furniture Co. He is a member of the First Ward Republican Club and both he and his wife, the former Natalie Youtie, have been active in GOP circles. Their home was the scene of several "Koffee Klatches" during election campaigns.

The new councilman is vice president of the Second Marine Division Assn., a national organization comprised of former and active U. S. Marines. At a recent

convention of this group, in Denver, Col., Segal was appointed reunion committee chairman and in this capacity was successful in obtaining the July, 1964 reunion convention for Atlantic City.

Of vital interest to Segal is the Memorial Scholarship Fund which provides scholarships to children of deceased veterans. This project is increasing each year and continues to be a major association activity.

In World War II, Segal served as a sergeant in the Marines. He was in service for more than four years, participating in many
